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4. Overview of Further Education and Apprenticeships for Adults


This section of the report provides an overview of the key features and trends in delivery of Further Education (FE) and Apprenticeships to adults (ie those aged 19+). Further Education will typically be delivered in a classroom setting, whereas apprenticeships are work-based with some off the job training. Both FE and apprenticeships for adults are delivered by a wide variety of providers although FE delivery tends to be dominated by colleges and local authority adult learning services. This section, and subsequent sections, focusses on delivery to residents of Cheshire and Warrington rather than delivery by providers based in Cheshire and Warrington.

4.1 Overview of Further Education

Whilst individuals will enrol on courses for many reasons, there are fewer policy drivers that underpin government investment in FE. These include supporting social inclusion and cohesion by providing skills for life (eg English, Maths, baseline digital skills, English for speakers of other languages etc); supporting people without work to secure employment by acquiring relevant skills; and, supporting people to progress in employment by securing the relevant skills.


The population of Universal Credit (UC) claimants includes those in low paid employment and those out of work seeking employment and is, therefore, a reasonable proxy for those for whom public investment in FE is meant to benefit.

The two maps below illustrate FE learning aim enrolment density by ward in Cheshire and Warrington and UC claimant density by ward in Cheshire and Warrington. It can be seen from this that there is a reasonable alignment of areas with high FE enrolment with areas that have high numbers of UC claimants. Six of the ten wards with the highest density of FE enrolments also appear in the top ten wards with highest UC claimant density. Every ward in the top two deciles for UC claimant density appears in the top three deciles for FE enrolment density.




The wards with the highest number of FE enrolments per 1000 population in 202/21 were

4.1.1 Enrolments in FE


The total number of learning aim enrolments by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington in FE in 2020/21 was 27,467. This was a decrease of more than a third from the 2018/19 figure of 41,457. Much, but possibly not all, of this decline can be attributed to the impact of the pandemic. Enrolments will have been seriously constrained at the end of the 2019/20 academic year as well as for the 2020/21 academic year.



4.1.2 Funding of FE

Learning in FE is funded by a variety of routes. In the data provided by the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA), funding for FE is assigned to one of four categories:


- Adult Skills the main budget supporting adult learning in FE
- Community Learning a budget allocated for the purposes of personal and community development learning
- European Social Fund a budget formerly accessed from the European Union supporting
 people to access employment and for workforce development (only data for ESF activity
 administered by the ESFA is available, data for DWP co-financed activity and direct matched
 activity is not available)
- Non-funded learning funded through the Student Loans Company or directly by the learner.






In 2020/21, the Adult Skills budget accounted for almost half (46%) of all enrolments, with a further fifth (22%) being funded by ESF.

There were marked differences in the decline in enrolments between 2018/19 and 2020/21 when activity is considered by funding stream. Learning funded through the Community Learning Budget declined by almost two thirds (64%); non-funded and adult skill budget activity declined by just over a quarter (28% and 26% respectively); whereas activity funded by ESF declined by only 6%.







4.1.3 FE Providers

In 2020/21, there were 27,467 learning aim enrolments by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington, with 299 providers in total. All providers with more than 350 enrolments in 2020/21 across all funding streams are shown in the table below. PeoplePlus group delivered the highest volume of enrolments to Cheshire and Warrington residents by virtue of it being the prime contractor for an ESFA-led ESF programme. Cheshire College South and West, Warrington & Vale Royal College, and Cheshire West and Chester Council delivered the most enrolments funded through the Adult Skills Budget. Warrington & Vale Royal College, Cheshire West and Chester Council, Cheshire East Council, and the Workers' Educational Association delivered the most Community Learning enrolments.



4.1.4 Subcontracting

The practice of subcontracting from one provider to another is common for adult learning in FE. For ESF, the delivery model adopted by the ESFA is based on appointing a 'prime' contractor who is then expected to subcontract activity to other delivery partners. This is reflected in the fact that 83% of all ESF funded activity with residents of Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 was subcontracted.

Some Community Learning providers – particularly some local authorities – subcontract some or all of their ESFA budget; often with community organisations that are best positioned to reach particular communities or types of learner. Over 40% of all Community Learning enrolments by residents of Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 were with subcontracted providers.

Subcontracting of activity funded by the Adult Skills Budget is less prevalent than for ESF or Community Learning, but still common. Sometimes providers will subcontract activity to specialist providers to augment and improve the curriculum they are able to offer. Sometimes, providers that believe they will struggle to earn all of their Adult Skills allocation will seek to earn their full allocation by subcontracting some of it to third parties. 18% of Adult Skills funded enrolments by residents of Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 were with subcontracted providers.


All subcontractors with more than 100 learning aim enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents in 2020/21 are set out in the table below, by funding source. Almost 40% of all ESF enrolments were with Training Strategies Ltd, with a further 12% being delivered by Remit Group Ltd. Learning Curve Group Limited, the Skills Network Limited, and Helen Howarth all delivered over 200 Adult Skills Budget enrolments. The majority of Community Learning subcontracted activity was with community and specialist providers.




4.1.5 Level of learning in FE

The level of learning aims enrolled on by adult residents of Cheshire and Warrington between 2018/19 and 2020/21 is set out in the chart below. In 2020/21, almost 10,000 enrolments were at Level 2 with a further 8,000 being below Level 2. The decline in enrolments between 2018/19 and 2020/21 at Level 2, Level 3 and Level 4+ (-11%, -17%, -5% respectively) was less than the overall decline in enrolments of 34%.

Learning aims with no assigned Level are primarily a feature of Community Learning provision (although some are delivered through ESF). This accounts for the decline of 58% in this type of enrolment between 2018/19 and 2020/21.








PeoplePlus Group (ESF) and Cheshire East Council (Community Learning) each accounted for over 1k (20%) of all enrolments on learning aims with no assigned level. PeoplePlus Group (ESF), Cheshire College South and West (Adult Skills), and Warrington & Vale Royal College (Adult Skills) were the three largest providers at level 2. Cheshire College South and West, Warrington & Vale Royal College, and Blackpool and the Fylde College (all Adult Skills) were the largest Level 3 providers.



4.1.6 Sector Subject Areas in FE

The Sector Subject Areas (SSAs) of enrolments in FE by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 is set out in the chart below. Most enrolments were in 'Preparation for Life and Work' (7k), 'Health, Public Services, and Care' (6k); with 'Business, Administration and Law' and 'Retail and Commercial Enterprise' also seeing more than 2k enrolments.



Between 2018/19 and 2020/21, enrolments in the SSA 'Preparation for Life and Work' saw the largest volume reduction (4.5k). this 39% reduction was broadly in line with the overall reduction of 34% n this period. The largest percentage reductions were in 'Leisure, Travel and Tourism' at 85% (2.2k reduction in enrolments) and in 'Arts, Media and Publishing' at 69% (2k reduction in enrolments). Industries linked to these two sectors were particularly badly hit at the height of the pandemic and the reduction in learner demand reflects that.



4.1.7 Learner characteristics in FE

4.1.7.1 Gender

Overall, 57% of enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents in FE in 2020/21 were female, with females accounting for a higher proportion of enrolments at every level of learning other than at below level 2, where males accounted for 55%.

Females also accounted for a greater proportion of enrolments than males in each funding stream (other than ESF). Almost two thirds of enrolments funded by the Adult Skills Budget (64%) were by females. By contrast, over two thirds of enrolments on ESF funded activity (68%) was by males.

4.1.7.2 LLDD

Learners that considered themselves to have a learning difficulty and/or disability and/or health problem accounted for 22% of all enrolments with between 20% and 23% of enrolments across all funding routes.

4.1.7.3 BAME

Just less than 10% of learners identified themselves as being from a Black and Minority Ethnic (BAME) background. 2021 Census data by ethnicity is not currently available to benchmark this proportion against the wider population of Cheshire and Warrington. The proportion of BAME enrolments decreased as the level of learning increased with BAME accounting for 18% of enrolments below Level 2 but only 4% at Level 4+.



The proportion of BAME enrolments also varied by funding route, with 14% of all enrolments through the Adult Skills Budget being BAME; but this being 7%, 7%, and 5% for Community Learning, ESF and non-funded respectively.


4.1.7.4 Prior Attainment

Over half of Cheshire and Warrington residents that enrolled on an FE learning aim in 2020/21 were qualified at Level 2 or below. This shows, as might be expected, that delivery is disproportionately focussed on the lower qualified (compared to the overall population of the area).




4.1.7.5 Age Profile

The age profile of enrolments varies according to funding route with Community Learning showing an older learner profile than for other types of Further Education.




This is reflected in the age distribution of learners by level, with learners on learning aims not assigned a level (often a feature of Community Learning delivery) being older than the age profile of delivery at other levels.





4.1.7.6 Employment status on the first day of learning

Overall, there were more enrolments in FE by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington from those not in employment (14.5k) than those employed/self-employed (10.3k) in 2020/21.




These proportions varied significantly by funding route. The number of enrolments on Adult Skills Budget that were not in employment was slightly larger than the numbers employed/self-employed (6.5k and 6k respectively). However, the numbers receiving support from ESF were very skewed to those not in employment (5.3k vs 0.6k) and the numbers on non-ESFA funded provision were skewed to the employed/self-employed (2.8k vs 1.1k).

The proportion of learners that were employed on the first day of learning varied according to the level of learning undertaken. Generally speaking the higher the level of learning, the higher the proportion of learners that were employed on the first day of learning, with this going from 20% of learners on learning aims below Level 2 to 62% of learners on learning aims at Level 4+.



4.2 Apprenticeships overview

An apprenticeship is a paid job where the employee learns and gains valuable experiences. Alongside on-the-job training, apprentices spend at least 20% of their working hours completing classroom-based learning with a college, university or training provider which leads to a nationally recognised qualification. In England, it is a statutory requirement for an apprentice to spend 20% of their paid time 'off-the-job'. This involves essential training to help the apprentice gain the skills needed to complete their apprenticeship.

The training can take place in or out of the work environment. Some employers will offer in-house training, others may work with colleges, universities and training providers to deliver the training for them. The training must equate to 20% of the overall contracted hours for the duration of the apprenticeship. It can be delivered flexibly, for example, as part of each day, once a week, or as a block release.

There are four different levels of apprenticeship:


- Intermediate equivalent to five good GCSE passes.
- Advanced equivalent to two A-level passes.
- Higher equivalent to the first stages of higher education, such as a foundation degree.
- Degree comparable to a Bachelors or Masters degree.

In the remainder of this report, the categories of 'Higher' and 'Degree' apprenticeship have been combined and are reported as 'Level 4+'.

4.2.1 Apprenticeship Starts


The chart below sets out the starts on apprenticeships by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington from 2018/19 to 2020/21. The pandemic started in February 2020, halfway through that academic

year. In part because of this, apprenticeship starts declined by almost 500 (4,670 to 4,194) between 2018/19 and 2019/20 but recovered partially to 4,407 in 2020/21 - a decline of 6% on 2018/19.





This pattern over three years was repeated in all three local authorities with 2020/21 starts being 3% lower than 2018/19 in Cheshire East, 6% in Cheshire West and Chester and 10% in Warrington.

This pattern was also largely repeated in Cheshire and Warrington parliamentary constituencies, although there were slight increases in starts seen in Weaver Vale, Congleton and Eddisbury in 2020/21 compared to 2018/19.



4.2.2 Apprenticeship Providers


In 2020/21, the 4,407 starts on apprenticeships by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington were delivered by 455 providers. The table below ranks all providers that delivered 50 or more starts by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21, and the starts that they delivered in the three years 2018/19-2020/21. Total People and Lifetime Training were the two largest apprenticeship providers for both 2020/21 and for the three years 2018/19-2020/21, with both providers delivering more than 200 starts in 2020/21.

4.2.3 Apprenticeship Levels

The chart below sets out the data for apprenticeship starts by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington, by Level, between 2018/19 and 2020/21. Between 2018/19 and 2020/21 starts at Level 2 decreased by 30% (1,230 to 855) and at Level 3 the decrease was 17% (2,259 to 1,880). By sharp contrast starts at Level 4+ increased by 42% in this period from 1,181 to 1,672.


In 2020/21 19% of starts were at Level 2, 43% were at Level 3, and 38% were at Level 4+.



4.2.4 Apprenticeship Sector Subject Areas

The overall decrease observed for starts on apprenticeships for adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington was not uniformly repeated across Sector Subject Areas (SSAs). Starts in 2020/21 were higher than for 2018/19 in the following SSAs:-


- Arts, Media and Publishing
- Construction, Planning and the Built Environment
- Education and Training
- Health, Public Services and Care
- Information and Communications Technology



4.2.5 Characteristics of apprentices

4.2.5.1 Gender


There were more starts on apprenticeships by females aged 19+ resident in Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 than there were by males. Females accounted for 58% of starts.


4.2.5.2 BAME

5% of starts on adult apprenticeships by Cheshire and Warrington residents were by learners classified as BAME. 2021 Census data by ethnicity is not currently available to benchmark this proportion against the wider population of Cheshire and Warrington. When compared with enrolments in by adult residents in FE at Levels 2, 3 and 4+, the proportions are similar.



4.2.5.3 LLDD

The proportion of apprentices identifying as having a learning difficulty and/or disability and/or health problem was 11%, which is about half the proportion of adults that did so in Further Education.

4.2.5.4 Prior attainment

The prior attainment of adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington that started an apprenticeship (all levels) in 2020/21 is set out below. It is notable that more than a quarter (26%) were already qualified at Level 4 or above, and over half were already qualified at Level 3+. This suggests that adult apprenticeships are an important vehicle for employer-led adult retraining.




5. Community Learning

Community Learning includes a range of community based and outreach learning opportunities and covers a wide range of learning designed to help people gain a new skill, get back into learning, develop their interest in a subject and prepare for higher level study. Designed to be accessible to people of all backgrounds and abilities, this type of learning is often non-accredited which means that learners are not working towards a formal qualification. It is primarily delivered by further education colleges, local authority education services, and voluntary and community organisations, and is funded by the ESFA.

Enrolments on Community Learning by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21, by ward, measured as per 1,000 of the 16-64 year old population are shown in the map below. The wards with the highest proportions starting Community Learning (ranked) were:



5.1 Enrolments on Community Learning

There were very significant reductions in the number of adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington that enrolled on Community Learning between 2018/19 and 2020/21. Learning aim enrolments decreased from 11,350 in 2018/19 to 4,048 in 2020/21 – a reduction of almost two thirds (64%). This compares with a reduction across all FE in Cheshire and Warrington of about a third in the same time period.

One explanation for this difference may be that much Community Learning will have been delivered in community settings or by community organisations as opposed to in settings or providers whose main business is the delivery of learning. Whilst this outreach is regarded as a strength of Community Learning, it may have been more challenging for this type of provision to respond to the constraints on delivery required in a public health crisis.

5.2 Community Learning providers

In 2020/21, 46 providers delivered 4,048 learning aim enrolments in Community Learning by adult residents of Cheshire and Warrington. The providers that delivered more than 50 learning aim enrolments in 2020/21 are set out in the table below. Between them, Cheshire East Council, Warrington & Vale Royal College, Cheshire West and Chester Council, and the Workers' Educational Association delivered 88% of all Community Learning learning aim enrolments in 2020/21.


5.3 Subcontracting


Subcontracting is a well-established practice in Community Learning. This tends to reflect the fact that a lead provider (often a local authority) will judge that other organisations are better placed than it to deliver to particular segments of the community, either because of location or specialism, or both. 40% of learning aim enrolments on Community Learning in 2020/21 by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington were with subcontracting organisations. Those providers with more than 50 enrolments are set out in the table below and the community and/or specialist nature of the providers listed is evident.

5.4 Sector Subject Area of delivery

The Sector Subject Area (SSA) profile of delivery of Community Learning to adult residents of Cheshire and Warrington is set out in the chart below. The overall reduction in enrolments between 2018/19 and 2020/21 was 64% as reported above. There were four SSAs that experienced reductions higher than this were Arts, Media and Publishing (76%), Information and Communication Technology (71%), and Preparation for Life and Work (66%) all saw reductions of two thirds or more. Delivery in Leisure, Travel and Tourism was almost completely wiped out with a reduction of 97%.






5.5.1 Gender

Almost three quarters (72%) of learning aim enrolments in Community Learning in 2020/21 by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington were by females.




5.5.2 Age profile of learners




5.5.4 LLDD

Learners that considered themselves to have a learning difficulty and/or disability and/or health problem accounted for 21% of all enrolments which is very similar to the 22% reported for all FE enrolments.

No data was collected on the employemnt staus of learners on the first day of learning for over a third of all enrolments. For learners where data was collected, the volumes of those employed/self-employed, economically inactive, and unemployed seeking work were all at similar levels.

The prior attainment profile of Community Learning learners is hourglass. Almost a third have no qualifications, over a quarter are qualified at Level 4 or above.




6. European Social Fund learning

The European Social Fund (ESF) is the European Union's (EU) main instrument for supporting jobs, helping people get better jobs and ensuring fairer job opportunities for all EU citizens. It works by investing in Europe's human capital – its workers, its young people and all those seeking a job. The data considered in this report extends only to that part of ESF investment administered by the ESFA, and therefore excludes a significant proportion of the funding administered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), or where the project sponsor bring their own matched funding, in both of these instances, comparable data is not available.

Following Brexit, the UK will no longer access ESF. The Government is replacing previous ESF investment with investment from the Shared Prosperity Fund, the prospectus for which was launched in April 2022.

In practice a very large proportion of ESFA-administered ESF activity supporting adults in Cheshire and Warrington has been focussed on the unemployed and economically inactive (see section xx below). The map below shows the estimated ESF enrolments per 1000 of the working age population in 2020/21. Comparison of this map with the map of out of work UC claimants at section 3.4.3 above shows a very close alignment between areas of need and areas of ESF delivery. Eight of the ten wards with the highest estimated proportion of the working age population claiming UC whilst out of work also feature in the list of ten wards with the highest estimated proportion of ESF enrolments.



6.1 Enrolments on ESFA co-financed ESF programmes

Like other FE funding routes, there was a decline in ESF enrolments between 2018/19 and 2020/21. However, the 6% decline in ESF enrolments was significantly lower than the overall decline of 34% experienced across FE. It is not clear why this was the case. It is notable though that unlike other funding streams, ESF had no direct financial mitigation of the pandemic. In other words, payment to providers continued to be directly driven by activity and outcomes. This was not the case for the Adult Skills or Community Learning budgets.

6.2 Providers and sub-contractors

There is a tension between the policy objectives of ESF (which suggests a pool of providers is required to deliver the objectives of the programme) and the management capacity of the ESFA (which constrains the number of providers it can directly manage). The ESFA has sought to resolve this tension by awarding contracts to 'prime' contractors. This involves awarding a limited number of

contracts to prime contractors who are then expect to subcontract activity to a wider pool of providers. In other words, subcontracting in ESF is the norm.

In Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21, there were 10 providers responsible for delivering ESF funded enrolments to residents, only 4 delivered more than 100 enrolments and 88% of all ESF enrolments were on contracts held by PeoplePlus Group Ltd.

83% of all ESF enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents in 2020/21 were through subcontractors. In total, there were 58 subcontractors responsible for enrolling residents in this year onto ESF activity, with 8 providers enrolling to more than 100 learning aims. A single subcontractor, Training Strategies Ltd, was responsible for 39% of all ESF enrolments by residents in this year.

6.3 Learning aim delivery

The recruitment of individuals onto multiple (small) learning aims is also a particular feature of ESF-funded activity. Whilst this practice is known to occur with some Adult Skills and Community Learning funded activity (for example an individual requiring ESOL support might enrol on 2 Adult Skills budget learning aims concurrently to support, speaking & listening in English, and reading English); it is much more frequent in ESF where the enrolment of (unemployed) individuals onto multiple learning aims has often been the norm. This practice is to enable providers to assemble packages comprising units of learning that can be bespoke to the needs of the individual and the recruiting employer.

It is clear from the table below that whilst there were almost 6,000 learning aim enrolments, only 1,182 individuals benefited from support (counted using the ESF learner start and assessment aim,


which was recorded as a 'learning aim' to support provider payment when a new learner starts). This suggests that each ESF learner enrolled, on average, on four learning aims (ie (5,848-1,182)/1,182).

One of the specialisms of the largest provider of ESF, Training Strategies Ltd (see 6.2 above), is 'Door Supervision'. It is easy to appreciate how a learner looking to enter this industry might benefit from learning aims focussed on both 'dealing with disorderly and aggressive behaviour', and 'protecting from the risk of violence at work'. Both of these learning aims feature in the table below which lists the learning aims with the highest volume of enrolments in 2020/21.


6.4 Enrolments by Level of learning

About 40% of ESF enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents were below Level 2, with another 35% being at Level 2. Almost a quarter (23%) were not assigned to a level.



6.5 Enrolments by Sector Subject Area

As might be expected from activity predominantly focussed on supporting unemployed people to access work, the most common SSA for enrolments was preparation for Life and Work, which accounted for almost 30%.




6.6.1 Gender

Over two thirds of enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents on ESF-funded activities were by males. This may be because the specialisms of the three main providers were in occupational areas that are dominated by men. Key specialisms for Training Strategies Itd include security (door work) and taxi driving, for PeoplePlus they include security and construction, and for Remit Group limited they include automotive and digital.




6.6.2 Age profile


7. Learning below Level 2

This chapter of the report considers learning below Level 2 that is funded from the Adult Skills Budget (or that is not funded by the ESFA). It excludes learning that is funded through ESF or through Community Learning – this type of learning is considered in chapters 5 and 6 above.

As will be seen below, this type of learning is predominantly focussed on the delivery of basic skills and ESOL learning aims. It is therefore appropriate to consider the extent to which enrolments by Cheshire and Warrington residents come from places classed as deprived using the Adult Skills subdomain of the Index of Multiple Deprivation (2019). This is because the Adult Skills subdomain is constructed by combing two indicators:

- Adult skills: The proportion of working-age adults with no or low qualifications, women aged
 25 to 59 and men aged 25 to 64
- English language proficiency: The proportion of working-age adults who cannot speak English or cannot speak English well, women aged 25 to 59 and men aged 25 to 64 These places are mapped at section 3.7 above.

The map below shows enrolments by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington on FE learning aims below Level 2. There is a reasonable alignment between the areas highlighted here and the most deprived adult skills areas referenced above, although stakeholders may want to investigate apparent low levels of enrolment in Culceth, north Wilmslow/Styal, the east of Congleton and the community adjacent to King George 5th playing fields in Crewe.



7.1 Enrolments in FE below Level 2


7.4 Sector Subject Area of learning in FE below Level 2

As might be expected at this level, volumes learning aim enrolments were dominated by those categorised as 'Preparing for Life and Work'. In 2020/21, almost two thirds (64%) of learning aim enrolments belonged to this Sector Subject Area. Between 2018/19 and 2020/21, the enrolments in the following Sector Subject Areas declined more sharply than the overall decline at this level which was -43%:

- Arts, Media and Publishing (-72%)
- Business, Administration and Law (-50%)
- Engineering and Manufacturing Technologies (-46%)
- Information and Communication Technology (-69%)
- Languages, Literature and Culture (-57%)
- Leisure, Travel and Tourism (-98%)

• Retail and Commercial Enterprise (-68%)

Some of these SSAs are clearly linked to sectors which were particularly adversely impacted by the pandemic, whilst learners seeking to enrol on ICT learning aims will likely have been less comfortable with online learning (introduced to mitigate the impacts of the pandemic)


In 2020/21, 30% of all learning aims below Level 2 in FE enrolled on by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington were ESOL, a further 8% were for English or Maths. The highest volume of enrolments was on 'Non regulated Adult skills formula funded provision, Entry Level, Preparation for Work, Up to 2 hrs', a very short learning aim which is highly like to be delivered on work-focussed provision such a Sector Work Based Academies.














Enrolments by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington on Level 2 learning in FE, 2020/21




8.1.4 Enrolments by funding model

8.1.5 Enrolments by Sector Subject Area

Over a third of learning aim enrolments at this level were in the 'Health, Public Services and Care' SSA in 2020/21. The only other SSAs with in excess of 500 enrolments in 2020/21 were 'Preparation for Life and Work'; 'Retail and Commercial Enterprise' and 'Business, Administration and Law'. 






8.2.1 Apprenticeship starts at level 2



8.2.3 Sector Subject Area of Apprenticeships at Level 2

In 2020/21 the two SSAs with the highest number of starts on apprenticeships at Level 2 by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington were 'Health, Public Services and Care' and 'Retail and Commercial Enterprise'. These were also the two highest SSAs for enrolments by adults in FE at Level 2.

The overall decline in starts between 2018/19 and 2020/21 was not uniformly mirrored across SSAs, with increases recorded for 'Agriculture, Horticulture and Animal Care', 'Construction, Planning and the Built Environment, and 'Health, Public Services and Care'. By contrast, there were declines in 'Education and Training' (100%); 'Information and Communication Technology' (96%); 'Leisure, Travel and Tourism' (83%); and 'Retail and Commercial Enterprise' (44%).




8.2.5.2 LLDD







9.1.3 Sector Subject Area of learning aims at Level 3

The SSAs with the highest number of learning aim enrolments at level 3 in 2020/21 were 'Health, Public Services and Care'; 'Engineering and Manufacturing Technologies'; and 'Retail and Commercial Enterprise'. 


9.1.5.1 Gender















10.2.5 Characteristics of adults starting on Level 4+ apprenticeships.


10.2.5.1Gender

There were more starts on apprenticeships at Level 4+ by females aged 19+ resident in Cheshire and Warrington in 2020/21 than there were by males. Females accounted for 55% of starts. This compares with 58% of all apprenticeship starts by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington being by females in this year.





Apprenticeship starts at Level 4+ by adults resident in Cheshire and Warrington show significant gender disparities in in four SSAs. 77% of the apprenticeship starts in 'Health, Public Service and Care' were by females. Conversely, 83% of the starts in 'Construction, Planning and the Built Environment' and 73% of the starts in 'Information and Communication Technologies' were by males.



10.2.5.2 LLDD

The proportion of adult residents of Cheshire and Warrington that started a Level 4+ apprenticeship that considered themselves to have a learning difficulty and/or disability and/or health problem was 9%. This was slightly lower than the proportion for all apprentices (11%) but half the 22% that enrolled on a Level 4+ in FE.

10.2.5.3 BAME

5% of learners identified themselves as being from a Black and Minority Ethnic (BAME) background, this is slightly higher than for FE enrolments at level 4+ (4%) but the same proportion as for all

apprenticeships. 2021 Census data by ethnicity is not currently available to benchmark this proportion against the wider population of Cheshire and Warrington.
